BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE: Rufus K. Wyllys (1898-1955) was born in Cambria, Michigan to Rufus J. & Katherine M. Sutton Wyllys, the youngest of five children. He spent most of his young life in the county seat of Hillsdale, MI and after a short stint in the military, worked in commercial and newspaper offices in Toledo, OH. He returned to home to earn a degree in arts and science from Hillsdale College. Wyllys then completed a master's degree in history at the University of Michigan and taught history at Kalamazoo College for two years. He decided to pursue his Ph.D. at the University of California in Berkeley, where he married his wife Eugenia Dunsmore in August 1926.

Wyllys finished his Ph.D. work in 1929 and secured a faculty position at Tempe State College (now known as Arizona State University) where he taught many of the history courses. He chaired the Department of Social Studies for 22 years. During that time he published many scholarly works including the much heralded *Arizona: The History of a Frontier State* in 1950. Wyllys was widely admired as a teacher, an exemplary scholar, and a tough critic of academic scholarship. Wyllys died of cancer April 16, 1955. (Hubbard, Paul. 1980. SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE: This collection contains unpublished manuscripts, lectures, source publications, and maps created by Wyllys for his publications. The majority of the materials in the collection are in fair to excellent condition. Highlights of this collection include a number of research papers written by Wyllys as young academic, biographical sketches of Sonoran politicians Ignacio Pesqueira & Manuel Maria Gandara, a number of short manuscripts on historic border relations between Mexico and the United States, and transcripts of speeches given by Wyllys.

This collection is arranged in three series and listed in chronological order. **Series I: Biographical; Series II: Publications; and Series III: Writings.**
